#### White Plains Hospital Opens First Dental Practice

#### New Law Requires Merchants to Provide Clear Disclosure of Credit Card Surcharges to Consumers

Westchester County Executive George Latimer, New York State Assemblywoman Amy Paulin, and County Director of Consumer Protection Jim Maisano are working together to ensure that residents are well-informed about a new law aimed at promoting transparency in credit card transactions. This new state law, which went into effect on February 11, 2024, mandates that merchants in New York State must provide clear and conspicuous disclosure of credit card surcharges to consumers.

Latimer said, "Transparent pricing is essential for consumers to make informed decisions. This new law will empower Westchester residents by ensuring they have clear visibility into any credit card surcharges they may incur, and I thank my colleague in government Assemblywoman Paulin for her efforts on its passage and Governor Hochul for signing it into law."

Paulin added, "This new law protects New Yorkers from hidden surcharges by requiring sellers to clearly post the price of a credit card surcharge. Credit card surcharges now have to be disclosed clearly so that customers are fully aware of them upfront and not just when they go to pay. The new law also prevents businesses from charging a higher fee than what they are charged by the credit card companies. This legislation is ultimately about transparency, fairness, and preventing consumers from being misled when making purchases using credit cards. I thank Jim Maisano, Director of the Westchester County Department of Consumer Protection, for bringing this important issue to my attention. His idea is now a law which will protect



New Yorker consumers."

The new law limits credit card surcharges to the amount charged to the business by the credit card company and requires businesses to clearly display the total price inclusive of any surcharges before checkout. It aims to prevent consumers from being surprised by hidden fees and ensures that they have a clear understanding of the costs associated with credit card transactions.

Maisano said, "This law reinforces the principles of fairness and transparency in commercial transactions. We are committed to ensuring that consumers are protected from deceptive practices, and this legislation is a significant step forward in achieving that goal."



#### Water Pipe Replacement, Southeast Consortium, 2024 Capital Budget Amendments Approved

Mamaroneck Town Supervisor Jaine Elkind Eney convened the February 21, 2024 Town Council meeting, saying that she attended a Westchester Municipal Officials Association Membership Meeting at Lionsgate HUB, Yonkers, on February 8th, "Tourism in Westchester County," which also explored film opportunities. Eney also attended the February 14th Sustainable Westchester (SW) virtual Annual Meeting. "SW is a non-profit consortium of Westchester County municipalities, the purpose is the effective collaboration of sustainability initiatives,"

"On February 15th, I attend- Supervisor Jaine Elkind Eney ed a Public Listening Session, hosted by the Westchester County

Board of Legislators in connection with a request by Westchester Joint Water Works for County approval of a land exchange transaction for construction of a filtration plant necessary to comply with State and Federal government safe drinking water requirements."

Eney reminded residents of the Town Tree Law requiring owners having property of 7,501 feet or greater to obtain permission before cutting down trees on their land. Contact Environmental Coordinator Elizabeth Aitchison, EAitchison@ townofmamaroneckny.org, 914-781-7845.

Next, a Public Hearing was opened regarding

replacement of approximately 170 linear feet of four-inch diameter asbestos water main pipe with a 6-inch diameter ductile iron pipe at maximum estimated cost of \$202,000 on Brookside. It is a Type II Action under State Environmental Quality Review Act regulations. The measure was approved.

Meeting as Fire Commissioners, the Board approved a bill of \$7,283.06 submitted by Fire Chief Thomas Broderick and bill for \$2,668.74, Fire Headquarters Gas Service, approved by Roll Call

In Affairs of the Town, renewal of agreement of Southeast Consortium 2024 was reached. The Consortium is a group of

eleven Westchester communities that have joined together to provide special recreation programs and opportunities for residents with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities. Town's contribution to Consortium will increase to \$26,685.75.

The 2024 Capital Budget Amendments encompass 1) Brookside Place Water Main;

2) Hommocks Ice Rink HVAC; 3) Town Center

Finally, the Board confirmed the appointment of Melissa Kaplan-Macey to the Housing Authority, Member C, starting date March 6th, expiring December 31st.

#### Senate Passes Senator Mayer Bill to Establish Statewide Office of Flood Prevention and Mitigation



On February 13, the New York State Senate unanimously passed a bill sponsored by Senator Shelley B. Mayer to establish a cabinet-level Office of Flood Prevention and Mitigation. The bill heads to the New York State Assembly for a vote and then, hopefully, to the Governor's desk for signature.

Through Mayer's legislation, the Office of Flooding Prevention and Mitigation will be tasked with coordinating existing state work on flooding, supporting municipalities in their efforts to prevent and mitigate flooding, and researching flooding impacts and mitigation in New York.

New York State is facing intensifying climate change-related hazards and storms, causing long-term devastation. Westchester and the surrounding Hudson Valley, Long Island, and New York City in particular face challenges recovering from destructive storms and are often unable to fully recover from one storm before another one strikes. It remains critical to the future of the state that proactive measures are taken to abate flooding.

This legislation will assess the areas of the state and populations at greatest risk, identify the best current emerging practices in flood management, preparedness, and resiliency, and make recommendations to the Governor and Legislature to help develop a high-level strategy for addressing flooding in our state.

From December to January, Senator Mayer conducted a survey of her constituents regarding their concerns and priorities. Twenty-five percent of the respondents chose Flooding and Climate Change as one of their top priorities.

Senator Shelley B. Mayer said, "I am very pleased that my bill, \$3,335, to establish an Office of Flooding Prevention and Mitigation has passed the Senate. During severe storms like Hurricane Ida, we lost community members, countless people endured severe damage to their homes, and more faced financial burden. Since Ida, residents and businesses in my district and in neighboring communities have been impacted by increasingly intense and frequent storms brought on by climate change, and are often hit with another downpour before they can rebuild. The Office of Flooding Prevention and Mitigation will provide New Yorkers with a strong, coordinated, and strategic approach to tackling the effects of

climate change, requiring all levels of government and agencies within government to work together to identify and execute mitigation and resiliency plans. It will help provide municipalities, counties, and individuals with the tools we need to tackle the scale of the work ahead."

Senator Pete Harckham, Chair of the Senate Committee on Environment Conservation, said, "People want meaningful action on the climate crisis, environmental protections, and stormwater mitigation. To do so, we need to put as much effort as possible into passing climate and stormwater legislation this year to safeguard our communities statewide. The

time for action is now, and I am grateful to my colleagues in the Senate for passing Senator Mayer's Office of Flood Mitigation and Prevention bill."

Assemblyman Steve Otis said, "Flood events and damage have become a frequent and repeated challenge throughout the state. Our state agencies have responded by offering more resources, expertise, and guidance to local governments to address flood recovery, mitigation, and preparedness projects. A new State Office of Flood Prevention will be an added benefit. The unit will coordinate state agency assistance and provide a central office for local governments to access expertise from state government."


Westchester County Executive George Latimer said, "Westchester County is no stranger to the devastating impacts of flooding exacerbated by climate change. Senator Shelley Mayer's bill, establishing the Office of Flooding Prevention and Mitigation, marks a crucial step towards coordinated action. By pooling resources and fostering collaboration among municipalities, this initiative promises to empower our communities with effective strategies to combat flooding and safeguard our residents' well-being."

Legislator Catherine Parker said, "As a Westchester County Legislator I want to commend and give tremendous gratitude to Senator Mayer and her colleagues in the New York Senate for recognizing the need to prioritize and address flooding in a significant and impactful way. New York has experienced billions of dollars in damage due to flooding as a byproduct of Climate Change. The creation of a cabinet-level office and position to hold expertise in best practices for funding





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
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#### **Estate Planning for Retirement Accounts**

Estate planning requires a lot of thought and involves so much more than drafting and executing a few documents. One thing you need to ensure is that your overall estate plan is coordinated with your retirement and other accounts so that your beneficiary designations do not upset what you think is a perfectly drafted estate plan. For example, if your will leaves everything to your son and daughter equally, but your 401(k) plan at work lists your daughter as the beneficiary, then she will inherit all the money in the 401(k) notwithstanding what the will says. As a general rule, a specific beneficiary designation in an account, including a retirement account, will control where the funds go upon your demise, regardless of what your will says.

Moreover, retirement account beneficiary designations present additional challenges due to the fact that, for many clients, this is where the bulk of their wealth is, and retirement plan custodians often have their own set of internal rules and policies that must be complied with; many of which don't make sense or are frustrating to deal with. Thus, in many instances, it is difficult to figure out how to complete your retirement account beneficiary designation forms, especially if you have a living trust, would like to leave money to charity, or wish to minimize income taxes. We have heard multiple horror stories from clients about some institu-

tions requiring medallion guarantees for signatures (which can be difficult to obtain), and others not allowing online beneficiary designation changes, among many others. Therefore, it is best to get your retirement account affairs in order before you become incapacitated or pass away so that your beneficiaries don't get caught up in a morass of red tape, causing delay and confusion.

If you are married, naming your spouse as the beneficiary of your retirement plan is usu-

ally (but not always, especially in a second marriage situation), the best option. This is due to the fact that a surviving spouse can "rollover" your retirement account into his/her own retirement account which typically leads to the best tax results. If you are re-married and have children from a prior marriage, there may be better options available to you that would involve the use of a trust to ensure that your children inherit the portion of your retirement account that you intend for them to have. However, this area of the law is fraught with traps for the unwary so please make sure you proceed with a competent estate planning attorney.

If you have charitable intentions, leaving



money to a charity from a retirement account is often an excellent choice since the charity will not have to pay income taxes on the distributions from the retirement account after your death. Whereas, if you name an individual as the beneficiary of your retirement account, he/ she will have to pay income taxes on the distributions. Thus, if you leave your \$100,000 retirement account to your daughter, depending on her own personal tax situation, she may have to pay \$35,000 in taxes and would

net only \$65,000 from your retirement account. If you left the \$100,000 retirement account to a charity, the charity would net the entire \$100,000, a much better result. You could leave your daughter \$100,000 from a non-retirement account and she would receive the entire \$100,000 since income taxes would not be owed on a non-retirement bequest.

The recently enacted SECURE Act made significant changes to retirement plan distributions, including eliminating the stretch IRA, except in the case of eligible designated beneficiaries (EDB). An EDB is a spouse, a disabled or chronically ill individual, an individual who is not more than 10 years younger than you, or a

minor child. For EDBs, the stretch IRA still lives and can result in significant financial and tax benefits to your family if all the relevant criteria are met. However, please note that the rules are complicated, especially if you want to leave your retirement accounts to a trust. A trust could be a good idea if you are concerned about protecting retirement assets from the cost of long-term care for a disabled or chronically ill beneficiary.

Retirement account beneficiary designations can be challenging, and it is important that they be coordinated with the overall estate plan. When updating your estate plan, do not forget to include a review of all your beneficiary designations, including retirement plans.

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#### Select Hommocks Students Achieve High Scores in Advanced National Math Challenge

The STEM Alliance was thrilled to collaborate with the Mamaroneck School District to bring the national AMC-8 Math Competition to thirty-eight students - including one elementary student - at Hommocks Middle School in January 2024. AMC-8 is a highly rigorous nationwide mathematics competition for students aged 14.5 years or younger. Test content focuses on advanced high school material tested through 25 multiple-choice questions that need to be completed in a 40-minute time frame. The test provides an opportunity for students to push themselves in analytical thinking, problem-solving skills, and mathematics - all areas that can assist in future careers.

Participating in the AMC-8 is nothing short of impressive. This "challenge by choice" experience showcases the extraordinary dedication and passion these students have for mathematics. To prepare for the test, many of the students also participated in a 10-week AMC-8 Math Club led by STEM Alliance Educator Arthur Washington. The STEM Alliance's Chief Programs Officer, Walter Gabino Rendon said, "Taking this test is not just about solving problems; it's about embracing the joy of intellectual exploration and pushing the boundaries of their mathematical prowess."

Now, the results are in. Again, this year, the Hommocks students excelled in their results. A score of 11 points or higher ranks a student in the top 25% of participants in the country. This year, Mamaroneck

School District had six students who scored 11 or higher. The highest scorers were as follows: 1st Place: Joshua Koenigsberb (Grade 8) with 18 points; 2nd Place: Zack Gourevitch (Grade 6), Leo White (Grade 8) with 17 points and 3rd place: Talia Grill (Grade 8), Gabriel Wertkin (Grade 6), and Felix Zebic (Grade 5) with 16 points each. Felix's results were particularly impressive as he stepped up to this challenge as a 5th grader at Murray Avenue School!

STEM Alliance President Meg Käufer spoke of the competition saying, "Diving into this rigorous competition willingly speaks volumes about each student's enthusiasm for learning and their commitment to excellence. They're really testing their potential and setting the stage for a future where their interest in math knows no bounds."
